PURPOSE

Ballarat Grammar is committed to zero tolerance of child abuse. All staff and members of our community have a duty of care to protect the safety, health and wellbeing of children in their care.

As a school with a diverse population, this includes students with a disability, Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander children and children from culturally and linguistically diverse backgrounds.

Child Protection Risk Management

The School has adopted a risk management approach to child protection by developing and implementing strategies to identify and mitigate our child protection risks based on:

- the nature of all school environments;
- the activities students undertake at the School (including the provision of services by contractors or outside the School's physical environment);
- physical and online environments that exist at the School; and
- the characteristics and needs of all of our students.

PROCEDURE

Risk Management Strategies

Ballarat Grammar has implemented the following risk mitigation strategies to ensure that the School maintains a proactive approach to our duty of care in protecting children from harm and comply with our legal and regulatory obligations:

- this Child Protection Program, including our Child Safety Policy and our Child Safety Code of Conduct:
- a Code of Conduct process implemented through training and communicated publicly;
- induction and ongoing training provided to staff annually, about identifying risks of child abuse in the School environment, their obligations and responsibilities for managing these



risks, how to report and respond to child protection incidents, and the School's current child safety standards;

- extensive policies and procedures relating to excursions and camps ensuring that child protection risks specific to excursions and overnight stays are identified and controls are put in place;
 - 1. Day Excursion or Activity Form
 - 2. Risk Assessment and Student Safety Form (Overnight or International Travel)
- ongoing, periodic reviews of all physical School environments to eliminate physical isolation risks, such as solid classroom doors or rooms with no windows, or implement procedural controls where elimination is not possible;
- specific procedures for verifying the Working with Children Check status of all staff / visitors, who may have direct unsupervised contact with students, to ensure that students remain safe in all School environments both internal and external to the School grounds; and
- a system of assurance through which risks of child abuse, and actions taken to reduce or remove these risks (risk controls), are recorded. The system is also used to monitor risk controls and to evaluate their overall effectiveness on a regular basis.

Risk Analysis Tools

Consequences Criteria

Consequence	Health and Safety Consequence Description
Insignificant	First aid only – no measurable impact or lost time
Minor	Medically treated injury Peer support for stress event
Moderate	Hospital treatment (outpatient), less than 3 days lost time Stress event requiring professional support
Major	Long term injury or illness (hospital admission) Possible permanent disability Stress event requiring clinical support
Severe	Fatality and/or permanent disability Stress event requiring extensive clinical support for multiple individuals
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Likelihood Criteria

Likelihood	Description	Indicative Frequency
Almost Certain (>95%)	Expected to occur	Prone to occur regularly Is anticipated for each repetition of the activity or event
Likely (66 - 95%)	Probably will occur ("no surprise")	May be anticipated multiple times over a period of time May occur once every few repetitions of the activity or event
Possible (26 – 65%)	May occur at some stage	May occur several times across DEECD or a region over a period of time
Unlikely (5 – 25%)	Would be surprising	May occur somewhere within DEECD over an extended period of time
Rare (<5%)	May never occur	May occur somewhere, sometime ("once in a life time / once in a hundred years")

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Note:

1. The indicative frequency may be relevant when assessing risk related to repeated activities or when objectives are to be delivered over discrete period of time but should not be the sole basis for assessment.

2. Likelihood may also involve consideration of exposure (e.g. if you live in a glass house you may be more prone to broken windows).

Acceptability Chart

Extreme = Intolerable (without Executive Oversight)	Immediately consider whether this activity should cease. Any decision to continue exposure to this level of risk would be made at Executive Officer level, would be subject to comprehensive analysis to generate a detailed risk treatment plan and be the subject of on-going oversight and high level review.
High = Tolerable (with continual Management review)	Consider whether this activity should continue. This decision would normally be made at senior levels, would be based on detailed analysis to generate a risk treatment plan and be subject to on-going review to ensure treatments remain effective and the benefits balance the risk.
Medium = Tolerable (with frequent risk owner review)	Exposure to the risk may continue provided it has been appropriately assessed, has been mitigated to <i>As Low As</i> <i>Reasonably Practical</i> (ALARP) and is subject to frequent review to ensure the risk analysis and treatment remain valid. Permanent/long term actions to reduce the risk should be considered.
Low = Acceptable (with periodic review)	Exposure to this risk is acceptable but is subject to periodic review to ensure the risk does not increase and evolving treatment(s) or accepted standards do not vary.
